Finally, on May 21st and 22nd a small piece of sailing history will be coming to PJYC docks. The 62' schooner "Brilliant" was built in 1932 for her owner and showman, Walter Barnum. She was used as an ocean racing yacht, and on her maiden voyage crossed the Atlantic Ocean in just over 15 days, 1 hour and 23 minutes, a record for a sailing yacht of her size. During World War II, she was used as a patrol vessel for the United States Coast Guard and patrolled the New England coast for enemy submarines. In 1953 she was donated to the Mystic Seaport who uses her for sail training. If you at the Club on either of those 2 days, please admire this historic vessel and thank the Mystic Seaport for maintaining her in such a fine condition.

I will end with my favorite "The Wind in the Willows" quote. "Believe me, my young friend, there is nothing - absolutely nothing - half so much worth doing as simply messing about in boats." - Kenneth Grahame.

I have heard it said that the third time is charmed. We finally caught a break and launched all the docks on Saturday April 8 with a day that had NO wind, NO rain, sunshine and a nice working temperature. The member turn out was exceptional. Although we had to start late because of the tide, the crane was on his way in 5.25 hours. Chris Beach and Ed Nielsen made great progress installing Wi-Fi to the docks. This



spring we spent a considerable amount of time and effort to streamline the installation of the electric to power our electrical stanchions so that we do not have to pay and electrical contractor to install the cables below our docks. We have a little bit of work to complete the electrical cabling but in the future as we become more familiar, we will be able to complete this in house with members only and save THOUSANDS in electrical contractor costs. We will have to have one more work party this spring but we are almost done.

I want to take this opportunity to bring the membership up to date with our proposed future expansions of the docks/slips etc. Brookhaven Town has agreed to add 60' x 150' of underwater land to our existing lease/license after we receive all approvals. This will enable PJYC to significantly increase our presence in Port Jefferson Harbor. In total we expect to have 38 slips, an increase of 18 from our current 20 slips and we anticipate the following use of the slips.

We will maintain, as before, one slip for the launch, three slips for anytime member use and six or seven transient slips depending on the size of the boats. Most of the transient slips will be on our T docks to make it easier for our guests to tie up and exit and leave the more secure slips for members. This will allow us to expand the number of available members' assigned slips from 10 to 28 slips. The slips created will be of several sizes to enable PJYC to accommodate a variety of boats. We will have slips large enough for 60' finger piers and will be adding fourteen slips with 30' finger piers. With larger slips we are creating, we are planning to increase the width of the finger piers to add to their stability. ALL of the new slips will be facing the entrance of the harbor to minimize the issues we had last year when the wind is out of the NNW that create white caps in the harbor and bounced our boats around. We also hope the new infrastructure will enhance our desirability and help with increased membership.

As a simple poll, members that may be interested in a slip in the near future, please email me at <u>alanwilliamjohnson@gmail.com</u> or <u>docks@portjeffersonyachtclub.com</u>. This poll is not binding but we would like to see how much interest there is by the membership during the permitting process. I have been advised by our expediters that the best time-line we can expect is that this could be a 2024 project. The cost of the slip as this is written will be \$145/registered/documented boat length and because we will have slips that can accommodate boats of different length I would like to look into eliminating the minimum length requirement. This may vary slightly in the future because I am seeing other marinas have a different fee per foot driven by the beam of the boat. The wider the beam, the more realestate the boat requires. Conversely, the narrower the boat, the more boats we can fit and I would hope a lower rate per foot.

Brilliant Visit—Some Club History

As Andrew mentioned, we will be host to the Mystic Seaport Schooner "Brilliant". A little history here. Brilliant was designed by the well known Olin Stephens. Launched in 1932 by the Nevins Yard on City Island in the Bronx. She was used by the Coast Guard during WWII to patrol for subs off New England! She even had machine guns mounted on deck! She was then bought by the famous sailor Briggs Cunningham, who invented the namesake sail control "the Cunningham".

FLEET CAPTAIN

For those unfamiliar, a 'Cunningham' is a line running through a grommet a little ways in and above the 'tack' (Where the main sail meets the boom and mast). It is used to control sail shape by pulling on the mast side (luff) of a sail, causing the draft of the sail to move forward some. Briggs ultimately donated the schooner to Mystic Seaport in 1953, where she is used as part of their educational program. When she visits us, she will have a group of students aboard.

We have some club history with her, as John Lane's wife Carol was one of the first stu-

dents to cruise on her at the Seaport!

John then arranged for several of our members to crew on her in a race in Oyster Bay back in 2017! It was a great experience (although a little more wind would have been nice, as when the current came in we had to retire!) Schooners are not known as



fast boats, although Brilliant is known as being fast as schooners go and regularly wins schooner races.

WHAT'S IT?

February/March What's It:

Charlie Masone, Phil Schiavone, and Stefano Basilico got it! Ralph Segalowitz guessed a body box! (Could be I suppose!)

It is a 'Steam Box' used to heat wood for bending. The heat softens the 'lignin' in



wood that gives it it's stiffness. You then have a few minutes to bend the wood to shape. When it cools, it pretty much maintains that shape. For wood boats it is used mostly for planks and such, but it is also used for furniture and musical instruments! I once saw Mystic Seaport preparing a bending jig for new davits on the whaleship Morgan. They were one foot by one foot pieces of timber. The general rule is one hour of steaming for each inch of thickness. They actually steamed them for 12 hours in a custom built box! Then they bent them on the jig using, as one employee told me later, "several 'come along' winches and a lot of colorful language!"
