The **homepage**, portjeffersonyachtclub.com, has an updated weather widget! It shows any weather alerts from NOAA, and now shows the upcoming 4 High and Low tides with times and levels (relative to mllw, which is Mean Low Low Water). You can also CLICK it to get our local marine forecast!

The **password** for the 'Members Only' page (Under 'Social') is on your membership cards!

Reciprocal Privileges:

Your membership card now also shows your **'Member ID'** number. This is needed if you request a "Letter of Good Standing" which is needed by some clubs to get **reciprocal privileges.** The link to the request form is on the Member's Only page in the 'Useful Links and Forms' box. This is now automated and can email you and/or a host club directly, and you do not have to wait for a response from a board member. This ID may be used in the future for other features.

DOCKS & FLOATS

The installation of our new docks is proceeding nicely and by the time this is read all the docks will be installed and the water brought to each stanchion. The electric is expected to start about May 16. It was not scheduled earlier because we had to be sure all the docks would be installed.

I am looking forward to getting the docks power washed and stained to eliminate the "piano keyboard look". If anyone can volunteer and has a power washer please contact me or we will have it done by an outside contractor. I cannot get the docks stained until the new wood is completely dry and that will be another work project.

Thankfully, we will be just about out of dock projects but I will want to bring water and electric to the end of the new East ramp. This will be permanently installed to the ramp and we will not have to reconnect it each season.

I have been asked by several members about allowable changes and alterations to the slips. We now allow steps on the finger piers. Five, six and eight foot wide finger piers can have the steps permanently affixed to the dock but must be removed at the end of the season. Four foot wide finger piers need to be loose. Several members have used vertical

"whips" to hold their dock lines at a convenient height and that is also allowed as long as it is removed at the end of the season. We are also now allowing rubber rub rails to be installed on the dock at your own expense. It must be installed with SS screws and washers at 4" o.c. on the top and bottom flange to prevent the bumpers from dislodging it and also removed at the end of the season. Be careful of dock edging that is shipped in a roll. The edges tend to look like the edge of lasagna, wavy, when unrolled. A local source is Deck and Dock, 35 Zorn Blvd., Medford, 631 657-7892.

I have tried to assign member slips to best satisfy members known wishes and satisfying the needs of the yacht club, but that is not always possible and some members may be unhappy. All slips need to be considered temporary assignments. Our current slip holders will always be offered a slip, but you should never consider it your permanent slip location. Conditions will continue to change with members buying new boats, members leaving and us finding the measurements we asked for in the beam of the slips were not delivered and we have had to make changes midseason. We will not know the actual beams of the slips until they are installed and measured and if necessary changes will be made.

We have changed the slips for members anytime use to slips W1, W2 and W3. The slip assignment diagram is found in the members' only portion of the web site. Here is the link. https://portjeffersonyachtclub.com/guestmoorings/dock-diagram/ While I am on the subject of dock numbers, we have a new system of identifying our docks and slip numbers. Our original dock, our main N/S dock will continue to be called the main dock. On the West side of it we have the launch slip followed by slips 1 to 10. These are on the West side of the main dock and are further identified as W1 to W10. As we get to the North end, the dock to our left will be known as A dock and the dock to our right is being identified as B dock and has slip number 11 to 18. These slips are further identified as N11 to N18 as they are at the North end of our marina. As we make the turn to the East, The numbering continues from 19 to 36 and will be identified as E17 to E36 Slips E23 to E 37 are attached to the next dock and will be identified as C dock. The dock that attaches our two ramps is our D dock and has many uses. Among them is member dinghy storage in season. It can be used as an in water dinghy dock by our transients and the SBU Sailing team will be storing their

420's on the slings for their Spring and Fall seasons and will continue to store them on trailers for the summer. All of our dock will have identifying numbers to make reassembly easier in the spring.

You will notice that we no longer have the three-wide floating dock that members were using for their dinghies. Dinghies can now be stored in the slings on the new dinghy docks. Sign up for it by making a reservation on Dockwa. The cost is \$150 for the summer season. Dinghy storage in the dinghy rack in the lower lot is still free to launch and slip members and you will now have a 6'wide ramp to make launching more convenient.

Please review the dock rules for the members anytime use slips and general dock rules. There are restrictions.

I hope you enjoy the pictures taken as the docks have been installed. They have really changed our waterfront.







The 2023-2024 season was very successful for the SBU Sailing Team. We began the year with our first annual Alumni Regatta at the end of August. We had 26 past and current sailors come for a beautiful day of racing and socializing. It was great to catch up with so many alumni and we look forward to making this event even bigger in the future!

We competed in 11 regattas throughout the Fall and Spring seasons, with 3 regattas being hosted at PJYC. We hosted the Stony Brook Fall Open in October, the Seawolf Women's Open at the beginning of March, and the Stony Brook Cup at the end of March. We recorded podium finishes at all, finishing in 2nd, 3rd, and 3rd respectively! Being able to host home events and allow visiting schools a chance to sail in Port Jefferson is a great thing and we are very grateful to be able to have PJYC as a venue. A few other regatta highlights for the year included the Intercollegiate Offshore Regatta at Larchmont YC in October where the team got the chance to race a Sydney 38 and a trip to Oriental North Carolina for the Sailpack Invitational hosted by NC State University. Overall, our team finished the year ranked 22nd in our conference (out of 55 teams) and in the top 10 of club teams in the conference.

On the social side, we had a Friendsgiving dinner in November and our End of Year dinner this past Friday evening at the club. We also did an Inaugural Bring a Friend Sailing Day this past Sunday, which was very successful. Gorgeous weather allowed for a beautiful cruise to Pirate's Cove.

As always, we would like to thank PJYC for being a wonderful host venue. Whether it's a warm and sunny day in September or a cold, cloudy morning in March, sailing provides a wonderful opportunity and escape for our students and PJYC helps make that possible!




