I would like to thank everyone that helped provide all the ingredients and planning for our 2021 Commissioning Day held on May 23rd. It was another record turnout, and the weather was outstanding. First, that this was the first commissioning in PJYC History that was hosted by a son of a Past Commodore William C. Hausner (1986). Thank you all for sharing that with me. Secondly, the 2021 Program of Naming your 420. Again, for a \$295 donation to the Sailing Program you can have a name of your choice placed on one of the sailing school's 420 boats. I believe there are only six left so please help if you can. This money will be used ONLY for making the program stronger. There are a few pictures of boats that are named in this issue of the Bowspritz. And finally, the Proclamation that was made naming the WEST DOCK – JOHNSON DOCK. We are working on the sign and look to have in mounted by mid-July. Alan Johnson thank you again for all you have done and continue to do for our waterfront.

Alan will have more information in his report but at this time even if everything on the permit side continues to be positive, we will be tapping the brakes on the Finger Dock Project until the 2022 Season. As you well know the cost of materials and labor are skyrocketing. We asked for a refresh on the building costs of just the finger docks and the result was a staggering 60% increase. This will settle down and in hindsight we were lucky the permit process took longer instead of being in the middle of this project and having no control on costs. Next year things will level out and this project will move forward.

DOCKS & FLOATS

Status of finger piers

We have finally received NYS DEC and NYS DOS and Brookhaven Wetlands approvals for the finger piers. The last piece of the puzzle needed is a Brookhaven Town Building Permit.

There is not much work that needs to be done during the summer on the docks. We recently cut all the pilings (except the two most Northern pair which are being relocated with the new finger piers) to a uniform height and put pointed piling caps to seal the ends and prevent birds from roosting on the poles. We have recently acquired three additional docks for use as an additional floating platform to be used by members to store their small sailboats once they have paid an additional fee for summer. Launch members have always had the ability to store a small sailboat on the floats for a small fee but the Yacht Club has expanded this to include Small Boat members that wish to leave their boats afloat and ready to sail with the payment of a launch fee. I recently sent out a request for volunteers to get these docks ready and have had a positive response but will need more volunteers to finish.

I am often asked about how we are doing with reservations and reservation deposits.

From the opening of reservations to June 9 of 2019, 2020, 2021 here are the numbers.

These represent reservations made and some are into the future. It does not represent boats on the dock year to date, but I think it is awesome.

2020 did not start out as a banner year but at the end we were 23% ahead of 2019 in dollars collected from transient dockage.

Dock Rules

Every year we like to review the dock rules as approved by the Board and published in the Year Book and bring new and old members up to date. I have copied them and reprinted them below. Generally, the West side of the West dock is for members' short term use. Time on the dock is limited to one hour on weekends and holidays and five hours during the week. If you are the first to dock, please move your boat up the last dock with you bow out as far as you can. If you land one dock from the end you are effectively taking up 90 feet of dock and we will not be able to get three member boats on the dock. The East side of this dock is where we dock transients. If it is vacant and you need to dock, check with the drivers to confirm we have not reserved it for a transient. Our East dock is actively used by JSP during the week but is also available for member use and transient reservations. **NO BOATS ARE TO BE LEFT UNATTENDED AND OVERNIGHT WITHOUT BEING IN THE DOCK BOOK.** We do make exception for boats broken down, waiting for mechanics, parts or being measured for sails, etc. If this occurs, there is a book in the Launch Building for you to sign in with a reason why you are on the dock. Only you can give permission for yourself to stay on the dock by justifying it in the book. Racers often must leave before the launch opens so please sign in the book. Racers and members that come in after launch hours and dock, we will know with the cameras. Please move your boat as so as possible when the launch opens. Please consult with the drivers to check for conflicts. Any boat staying overnight awaiting repairs must be on the East side of the West dock as far South as is practical so as to not interfere with transient reservations and members short term use of the West side of the West dock.

Reprint of Dock Rules from Yearbook

Purpose: The rules below have been approved to enable members and transients who rent club moorings to make the greatest use of the club docks.

Short Term Use

1. During peak use times, all vessels will be restricted to 60-minute periods at dockside for picking up ice, taking on water, or loading supplies or passengers.
2. Peak times are defined as weekends and holidays.

Long Term Use

1. Activities requiring use of dock space for repairs, vessel wash down, or other activities which require shore power or water will be limited to periods of not more than five hours and then not during any peak use times.
2. Vessels returning after normal launch operating hours or departing prior to those hours may tie up overnight. Early departure vessels will coordinate their plans with dock personnel prior to leaving their craft at the dock.
3. Skippers of vessels left overnight must make arrangements for leaving the dock or having their vessels returned to their moorings no later than one hour after launch service begins.
4. Exceptions to the above requirements, when absolutely necessary, must be coordinated with the Launch Director or his delegate.
5. There will be a charge of \$2.00 per foot per night if a vessel is kept on the dock outside of the dock rules outlined in our by-laws.

Reprint of Dock Rules from Yearbook

(Continued)

General Practices

1. Crews of vessels berthed at the dock will assist arriving and departing craft with mooring lines and docking.
2. Courtesy, consideration and cooperation among you and your fellow boaters will solve more problems than any of these rules.
3. Intervention, if necessary, by dock personnel will be directed by a club officer. It shall be done in a firm, but courteous manner. Failure to respond can result in fines being assessed by the Board. Special fees may be required for certain types of use. Dock personnel will advise you of such requirements.
4. No vessels may be left at the dock unattended (see 2 & 3 above).
5. No Overnight Berthing Permitted (see 2 above).
6. No vessels will be permitted to use the dock space reserved for club launches.
