DOCKS & FLOATS

The Docks and Floats and Moorings are not only up and running, they are surging forward. Total deposits from Dockwa covering docks and moorings are up 38% ahead of last year to the end of June. I have two small carpentry projects I would like to have completed before we pull the docks. The first is to build a set of ladder steps on the East dock so that members in the fall can climb down the ladder to get access to the floating docks as they are retrieved and the second is to redo some of the fillers covering the electric in the docks. The first two docks need to be redone. It is simple carpentry and tools can be provided. Contact me if you are available.

We have completed the amendment to our license for the additional underwater land we need for the slip expansion. Alan Siris has completed the paperwork in Andrew Mathews absence while he is cruising. Both expediters have been working on their applications.

When members use the docks, please use the members' only docks first. They are

W13, W15 and W17 first. If they are not available call a launch operator to find out which of the transient spaces do not have reservation BEFORE using the slips.

I hope everyone is anticipating the slip expansion as I am. Our slips have made Port Jefferson Yacht Club a destination even more so than before. The existing slips have completely transformed our water front and with the addition of 18 member slips, we will see another major change to PJYC. The expansion will have some larger slips than we now have and slips for smaller vessels. It should be a very useable mix. If you get a chance, ask a launch operator to look at Dockwa and have confirmed how our facilities are filling up. We continue to receive 5 Star rating on Marinas.com. Every reservation receives a request from Dockwa to rate our service. Members should go to the Dockwa reservation section of our website and read the reviews and see how far we have come and what the boating community thinks of us.

We have made some minor changes to our slip expansion project. The next page has the plan we are filing. If you have any questions, contact me. At this point we cannot make any changes. The beauty of this plan is that we will use every dock we have with some of the docks needing modifications that the members will be able to do in the spring. The docks that we need built from scratch, we plan on having a dock builder construct them and deliver them for installation.

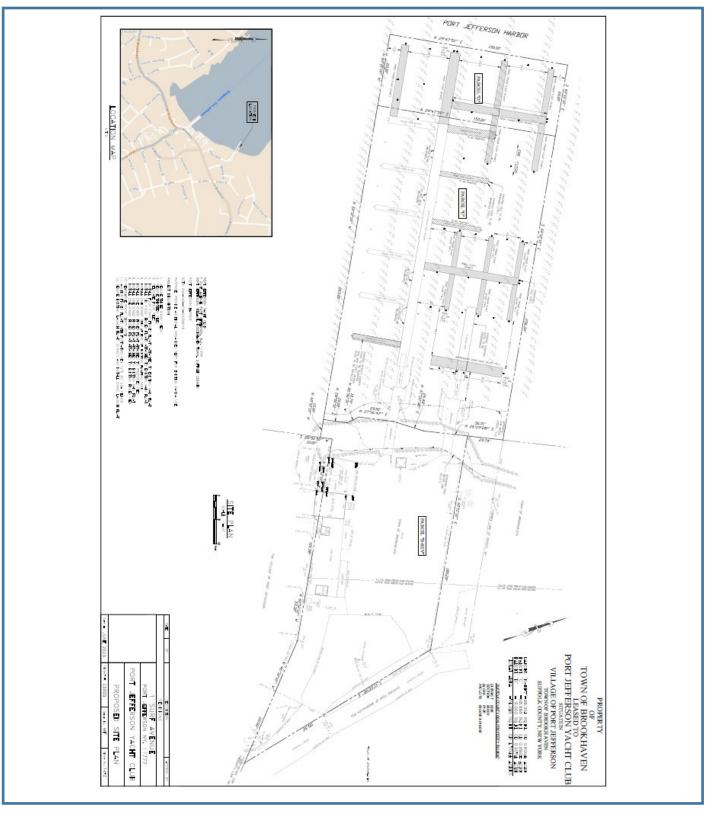



Born on the Fourth of July

According to statistics from the US Department of Veterans Affairs, 122,000 of the 16 million Americans who served in World War II are alive today in 2023. The US veterans who fought and won this global conflict are now in their 90's or older.

Today, I am sharing a story about Howard Bach, a WWII veteran who was born on July 4th, 1924. He is 99 years old this year! I feel lucky to be able to work with him as his occupational therapist where we focus on his balance, endurance, and overall strength.

Howard has had several different roles in his life. He is a US Navy veteran, married at age 22 and father of six, he is also a retired NYC police officer, a talented baker, harmonica player, and an avid sailor. During his treatment sessions, he likes to reminisce about his sailing days, while I try to pick up any tips he has to offer. "Always carry duct tape" he advises from experience.

During his childhood, Howard lived in a small house built up on stilts in a place called Springfield Dock, Queens which is where he developed his love of being on the water.


Howard was always happy to spend his free time outdoors on the water where he had a sense of place. He earned himself the aptly chosen nickname "Aquaman" in the neighborhood, where he became somewhat of a hero by saving several children from drowning after they had fallen off the pier into the canal. He spent long sunny days spearfishing off the jetty for blackfish and bass, and teaching himself to sail his 12-foot daysailer which he remembers with fondness to this day. He recollected, "I loved that little boat!".

Enlisting in the Navy at the age of 17, Howard served for over four years as a First Class Petty Officer on the battleship USS Mississippi stationed in the South Pacific. He tells me "We fought some battles, and we lost some good men too". He also warm-heartedly remembers the only time he disembarked from the ship during his enlistment. They arrived in Figi where the sailors were greeted by tall and colorfully dressed indigenous Figians with well wishes for the American sailors: "Bula!" which translates to "Wishing you happiness and good health!"


When he returned from the service, Howard moved to Richmond Hill, Queens where his parents had relocated (his childhood home would eventually be the site of John F. Kennedy Airport). Howard was married at the age of twenty-two, moving to Queens Village where they raised six children.

Not only had Howard taught himself to sail, but he also taught his daughters. He shares that he loved the challenge of sailing when it was extra windy. He would sail in Jamaica Bay and go to from Breezy Point to JFK Airport, and Coney Island. He recalls watching the sailboat races in Sheepshead Bay as the boats rounded the buoys. I wanted to know if he ever raced his sailboat, and he replied "No, not me... I'm just an old pirate."

Howard's career path led to law enforcement when he joined the NYPD at the age of 24, starting at the 81st Precinct in Brooklyn, then moving to the 105th Precinct in Queens, the 101st Precinct in Far Rockaway, and the 114th Precinct in Northwest Queens. He is proud of the fact that he made the rank of Detective after only six months, and also that he shot his gun only one time "up in the air!". Howard also recalls being present during the arrest of the notorious "gentleman bank robber" Willie Sutton in 1952. By the mid-1970's Howard was living in Breezy Point near the Rockaways, and he retired from the NYPD after a distinguished 31-year career.




Howard Bach-NYPD

Following retirement, Howard enjoyed baking cakes that were so delicious he would earn the new nickname "Pappycakes" from his daughter and co-workers at her nursing job.

I asked Howard to share a favorite memory from his sailing days, and he recalled an incident when he had been sailing home towards Breezy Point from out by the airport with a friend when they got caught in a rough storm. He recounted "It was dangerous, you know, because we had to go under two bridges and the tide was coming in and going out at the same time. It was so windy that the Coast Guard couldn't help us, they sped right by and almost swamped us! So, I took the sails and my friend took the tiller, and we finally made it back home. I was able to swim my boat to shore, we were lucky! I had some great sailing I tell ya!"


Now, Howard spends his days in the Community Living Center at the Northport VA where he is deservedly taken care of as an American hero who fought for our freedom. He listens to the news to stay informed of current events, participates in his therapy sessions to stay strong, enjoys visits with his family, and animatedly plays his harmonica to entertain the staff and his fellow veterans.

At the end of a treatment session, he once said to me "I wish I could go on your boat, I'd love to go with you. If I had a boat like yours, I would live on it." Then he thought for a minute and said "It's 22 feet? Ok, maybe just one night."





Description: Beautiful classic Pearson sailboat that has been loved by our family for over 20 years and kept in

Port Jefferson Harbor. We purchased the boat in 2001 and in 2012 replaced the original Volvo Penta diesel engine with a Yanmar 3GM 30FC Diesel Engine with a Sail Drive with 2 blade folding prop (probably the only 10M with a sail drive). It is currently in the water in Port Jefferson Harbor.

Structure: Hull and decking is fiberglass reinforced plastic (Decking has nonskid), and bottom is painted with blue anti-fouling paint. In 2020 fiberglass work on keel was completed by Port Jeff Marine (at the Boat Place). Stainless steel bow rail and stern rail, fold down swim ladder, and stainless steel stanchions with double lifelines.

Cockpit: Open cockpit with wheel on pedestal steering, two self-tailing winches, vinyl cockpit cushions.

Interior: Weather boards (recently refinished) for companionway-step down to standing head room interior. Quarter berth and navigation station on port side

with lots of storage. Starboard galley with alcohol stove, icebox cooler compartment (that drains into bilge), sink and storage.

Port settee pulls out to full side sleeping berth, and starboard settee pulls out to twin berth (and includes an upper twin berth that can also be used for storage). Forward v-berth cabin. All berths have fabric cushions. Wood flooring has been refinished and there is a pull-down table mounted on the bulkhead.

Forward enclosed head with shower. Replaced head (Raritan) and all hoses in 2014. Two hanging locker closetc.

For ventilation, there are two opening deck hatches and two Dorade vents.

Installed new fabricated anodized mast step in 2004.

Sails: Mainsail with full batten and dutchman system (good condition; with Doyle sailcover purchased in 2003). Harken roller furler for jib (#1 Genoa and #2 Genoa). Spinnaker (very little use) and whisker spinnaker pole

Other: Dodger (purchased in 2003) and bimini, both rarely used and in excellent condition.
