

Docks and Floats August 2020

Earlier we had reports of issues with the electric on some of the electrical stanchions. The crimp ends to the cabling was installed in 2006 and we are noticing some corrosion on the ends. This coming spring we will be installing all new crimped ends of the electrical cables without heat shrink so that we can better visually inspect and check for corrosion. Most of these electrical crimps were installed in 2006 and we have ordered new crimps and the tool with which to install them. We will Install he new crimps either in the fall or spring or both if necessary.

Reservations for the dock spaces and moorings are coming in nicely. This past Forth of July we had a record with a complete sell out on the moorings and docks.

The Boating Infrastructure Grant.

Kate Kevill had volunteered to apply for the BIG Grant. After hours of exploration she determined that the Grant was not a good fit for our club and we will not be applying for it.

I got the call you always hate to receive as Director of Docks and Floats. Our JSP docks had broken free in the August 3 storm. When I got down to the club I saw that we had two separate sections of floating JSP docks, and not the one section that we were supposed to have. One section was swinging dangerously close to the large catamaran that has spent almost two months on our transient mooring. Ed Dowd and his helpers secured one half of the docks to a mooring and the other dock to a piling on the East dock. The next day, the damaged docks were separated and beached between the east and west docks and the two parts of the dock were reunited temporally. On Thursday Ed Nielsen, Phil Schiavone, John Lane, David Diamond, Ralph Segalowitz and I removed the damaged dock portions, Vince Murphy went out in his truck to pick up lumber and hardware in Riverhead. Repairs were scheduled to be completed in one tide cycle. We started at 9 AM and had to finish before high tide a 1:30 PM. I did not think we were going to make it because remember we had no electricity. Luckily, Schiavone was able to get my generator started and then things went into high gear and we were done by 12 noon. We went to lunch till 1 PM and the docks were just starting to float. A couple of tugs by the launch and we were free. It took about an hour and a half to rejoin the docks and JSP had their docks back and the West dock was available for rentals (that is if we had electricity).

3 CHEERS FOR LAUNCH CAPTAIN JESSICA ROTE

At about 1700 hours on July 25th, the sailing vessel *Keghani* was visiting Port Jefferson from Cedar Point Yacht Club, where their vessel is kept. James and Barbara Garmirian from Reading Pennsylvania were aboard *Keghani*. In his account of the incident, Mr. Garmirian stated that he was having difficulty getting the mooring. Ultimately, his boat hook fell in the water, and, in trying to retrieve it, he followed the boat hook into the water.

Bon Vivant, moored nearby and visiting from the Centerport Yacht Club with Mr. Thom Hering aboard saw Mr. Garmirian fall in the water and watched as *Keghani* drifted toward *Bon Vivant*. Despite his efforts to fend off the drifting boat, *Keghani's* anchor scratched *Bon Vivant's* starboard beam. Apparently without further damage, the drifting boat was pushed to the stern of *Bon Vivant*. Mr. Hering noted that the PJYC launch was in the area at the time.

Indeed, the PJYC launch, operated by Captain Jessica Rote, was in the area. In her incident report, Jessica wrote that with the engine shut down she was able to pull up to the man overboard. Having gotten the man overboard into the launch, Jessica secured the *Keghani* and towed it out of the mooring field.

In his report of the incident, Mr. Hering wrote, "The launch operator did a stellar job managing the situation". And in his report of the incident, Mr. Garmirian wrote, "Jessica rescued me. I love her."

On behalf of all the members, I express our thanks to Jessica for so successfully managing a potentially lifethreatening situation, and we offer her a well-deserved "Well done."

- 1. At this time there is no use of the upper club house
- 2. Bar is closed until further notice
- 3. Rentals will begin once the curfew is lifted for such activities by New York State

- 5. Launches have been marked to show appropriate social distancing
