THE TRADITIONAL VILLAGE CUP SPEECH FROM THE COMMODORE

Fifteen years ago, when Chuck Chiaramonte was Commodore, he challenged our members to step up and get behind his idea of starting a Regatta for the care and cure of Pancreatic Cancer Patients. I couldn't possibly believe then, that I would be standing here now, fifteen years later, in what we are calling our million-dollar year. Please, let's all say thanks to Chuck Chiaramonte.

I'D LIKE TO TELL YOU ABOUT THE TOURS OF TWO CHARITIES, THE LUSTGARTEN FOUNDA-TION AND MATHER HOSPITAL NORTHWELL HEALTH

A few years ago, our Port Jefferson Village Cup Committee was invited by Suzanne Igneri of the Lustgarten foundation, to take a tour of the research Laboratories. The Labs are located on the sprawling Cold Spring Harbor campus. This is where the foundation focuses on pancreatic cancer research. If you haven't been there, you should know that the campus rests on over a hundred beautiful rolling acres, majestically pouring into the scenic Cold Spring Harbor. This is one of the most beautiful harbors and one of the most beautiful and prolific science communities in the world.

Our committee members arrived one by one and gathered at the front entrance. We were waiting to be brought in to learn about the facility, the scientists, and the serious work that was being undertaken. As we collected ourselves, we prompted each other to think about the questions we would like to ask these world renown scientists. For example, how are they going about the process of finding a cure ?

We were brought inside, and we were eventually brought down into the basement where there are no windows, and where the Lab work was going on in earnest. I saw test tubes, beakers, and slides. I also spotted some bottled water and some bread rolls. This gave me, my A Ha! moment. I figured it all out. They are only feeding them bread and water, and they have locked these scientists in the basement till they find a cure !!! (I kid our friends at Cold Spring Harbor).

We were afforded valuable time with the Lustgarten scientists. They explained to us the serious and hopeful work they are advancing. However, what really struck me most was the personal connection between some members of our committee, who have Pancreatic Cancer in their families, and some of these very scientists at the forefront, who have Pancreatic Cancer in their families. This is the connection that will propel our efforts forward, both in fundraising, and in science.

It turns out, the commitment to find a cure is personal, and that's how we will find a cure.

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I also had the opportunity to tour the Palliative Care Unit at Mather Hospital Northwell Health. This was thanks to Cynthia Court. On that day, I was to meet with my fellow committee members at the Hospital so we would get to see what our donations were supporting. I was very excited to see what I had been a part of, for these many years. I had a very busy day at work and was running late. I ended up missing my group and what I thought was my only chance to witness the good that the staff was doing. I leaned up against the wall outside the door and got very upset, and distraught. I got choked up and couldn't speak. At that moment a palliative care nurse came out of the doorway and came over to me. She put her hand on my arm and proceeded to comfort me, in my despair. I then realized, she must have thought, I was a patient. She tried to calm my emotions. She tried to inspire me with hope. She tried to give me her strength. She tried to restore my outlook. She reassured me that we will go through this, together. This is how I came to understand what these people do. Compassion, warmth, empathy, concern, grace, and inspiration. I was totally satisfied with my visit. This turned out to be all the tour I needed to take.

We lost a past Commodore in August

Ed Fell was Commodore in 1985

Here is his Obituary

Edwin Fell passed away peacefully on August 16, 2024. "Pops" was many things to many people- A son, a brother, a husband, a father, an uncle, a grandfather, and a great grandfather. But also a USAF airman, a musician, a teacher, a bandleader, a conductor, a marching band director, an umpire, a soccer referee, a sailor, a yacht club commodore, a businessman, a handyman, a carpenter, a genealogist, a world traveler, a role model, a comedian, and a friend. His kind, gentle, and patient demeanor made him well suited to all these roles and his sense of humor put all he knew at ease.

Edwin was born and raised in Abington Township, Pennsylvania. He attended West Chester State Teachers College in Pennsylvania, where he earned his teaching credentials in Music Education. He then served four years in the Air Force from October 1955 until his honorable discharge in August 1959. He was a trombonist in the Air Force Band. He and his wife Helen raised their family in Port Jefferson, NY where he loved sailing on his beloved boat Makai, becoming a leader in the Setauket yacht club. He taught instrumental music, gave private lessons, led band classes, and conducted the concert band In the Sachem School System in New York for 30 years until his retirement in 1989. His ability to play just about any instrument, and his unique talent in connecting with students through music, allowed him to positively impact the lives of thousands of children. He was loved by all who knew him.

Ed is predeceased by Helen (Spinelli) Fell, his wife of 67 years and his sister Sandy Robertson. He is survived by his sister Jean Tieser, children Edwin Fell, William Fell, Brian Fell, Helen Fell, as well as ten grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

DOCKS & FLOATS

The summer rush is almost over and now we find ourselves looking at the removal of our docks and floats. The crane is confirmed for 11/2 with an 8 am start.

Since we have so many docks to remove, stack and get them ready for the spring repairs, we will be doing it a little different this year. We have 67 docks/floats to pull in one tide cycle. If we set one dock every 5 minutes we will use up an entire useable tide cycle. Friday, November 1 at 7 pm at the club house we will have a planning session. The jobs we need done will be broken down to assigned groups, such as a crew installing shackles and tag lines or hooking up the crane slings, or crews bringing the docks into position ready for the crane. Crews will be assigned that night. Members showing up on 11/2 without being assigned to a crew will have to wait to see if any crew is falling behind before they can sign in. Unfortunately, with the amount of work we have to accomplish in one tide cycle this is the only way I can see it getting done.

Future projects we are considering subject to budgeting are replacement of the deck on the main dock, installation of rubber bumpers on all finger piers and a security gate on the man dock.


As we near the end of our season, we need to prepare for the removal of the docks and their storage in the lower lot. The dinghies and kayaks that have been stored on the dinghy rack will now need a winter storage contract which can be found here: https://portjeffersonyachtclub.com/dinghy-rack-spacerequest/ and in the member's only section of our website. Winter storage on the rack carries a fee of \$100 for the winter. We are no longer able to process the payments thru your Dockwa account. Please mail payments to the yacht club to PO Box 138. All dinghies, kayaks and canoes must be stored within the racks and not protrude past the front edge to allow the storage of our docks close to the racks.


