FROM THE HELM

As we approached Labor Day Weekend, I asked Nancy "Where did the summer go? How did it get to be almost September?" Her reply, "Well, we were out sailing for 3 weeks." Me: "Oh, right."

We did have some of the best weather and sailing conditions possible for the long cruise. We did have some excitement along the way. On the way from Nantucket, our VHF blew a fuse. After replacing the fuse AIS was working and VHF transmit was not. We took a ride to Vinyard Haven from Edgartown to get a temporary replacement radio. It did not seem prudent to be planning to go around the outside of the cape with no VHF. Thanks to Tim Raycek for the loan of a handheld as well. After, Edgartown, we split from the club cruise to head to Stage Harbor in Chatham. We had a wonderful dinner with Nancy's cousin. While the harbor is small and not too deep with a narrow channel entrance it was really a beautiful place. The harbor master was super friendly and very helpful. On the way into the harbor our depth sounder also decided to die. Perfect timing. I was thankful for the forward scan sonar as we headed out the next day to go around the bottom of Monomoy Island before turning to go around the outside of the cape. Two different tidal currents meet up there, it was a bit bouncy as we passed through that area. Conditions were about as good as we could have asked for, other than a bit more wind, which did fill in a bit during the day. We stayed about a mile offshore; I would recommend at least 3 miles. The lobster pots were shall we say plentiful. Maybe we would have seen some whales if

we were further offshore.

We had two great days in Plymouth. We took a whale watching trip and got to see humpback and fin whales as well as an ocean sunfish, which was quite an odd-looking fish. The Plymouth marina was great; we had a replacement radio and replacement transducer shipped to them. Installation of the replacement radio and transducer went smoothly.

We headed off across Cape Cod Bay, with no whales in sight and headed into Plymouth. It is a long way in, and I kept thinking how did they get the Mayflower into here without running aground. Answer, they didn't. They anchored offshore. We missed seeing the Mayflower II out sailing, it had been out the week before. Apparently, it was quite a production to get it out. We saw Plymouth rock, which was a bit underwhelming. Nancy's daughter Grace joined us for the second night in Plymouth from Boston. Plymouth Yacht Club was very hospitable.

We proceeded from Plymouth through the Cape Cod Canal to get to Marion. After a short stay in Marion, we headed out early for a long hard beat to get to Dutch Harbor in Jamestown. We took Bystander, my uncle's boat to the New York Yacht Club for dinner with my aunt and uncle. Our next stop was to be Stonington, but we decided after the trip from Marion to Jamestown that an unscheduled lay day was in order. We headed out early the following morning to get to Stonington.

Hurricane Erin was approaching and we knew we had to go early or decide to stay till Saturday. We dropped our mooring at 0605. We had winds from behind about 10-15 knots and seas about 1-2 as predicted. As the day progressed the winds increased as did the seas. We sailed with just the main and got to Port Jeff Harbor at 1500. By this time the seas were up to 4-6 feet, and we had some gusts over 30. We took the main down still outside, it was that or another gybe and conditions had become more exciting since our last gybe. We were thankful for the roller furling boom. We never had to leave the protection of the cockpit.

We made it back for the commodore's BBQ. It was very well attended. I think we had about 90 or so people in attendance. The weather could not have been better. Thank you to Nancy for organizing such a wonderful day.

With our feet on shore for just long enough for things to stop swaying, Ripple and Nine other boats headed off to the Northport Yacht Club on our traditional Labor Day Cruise. We sailed most of the way there, which may shock some of you. We all enjoyed a wonderful dinner in the Northport Yacht Club dining room. We dropped the mooring on Monday morning, hoisted the main and sailed all the way back into Port Jeff harbor. A great way to end the "official" sailing season.

This year's Village Cup was a great success. Thank you, Dave Hubbard, for taking over the reins from Chuck Chiaramonte after 15 years. Regrettably, we could not participate as I got a bad cold from Nancy.

There is still time for more sailing, fishing or just boating before our boats must be hauled for the winter. Enjoy it.

DOCKS AND FLOATS

The docks are performing as we designed them. The staining of the docks will add years to the useful life of the docks. The electrical distribution on the docks to the stanchions has worked without a glitch for three years. We had several failures of the lights on the top of the stanchions and all the lights that were fluorescent have been replaced with LED's and we have replaced the defective flood lights on the West ramp and we are working on the East ramp lighting. Rub rail installation is complete on members' only docks, transient docks and about 60% of the members' slips by the slip holders.

I just rechecked the tides for removing the docks onto the lower lot. I had hoped to remove the docks on the first Saturday in November but the high tide is not useable but November 8 we have a 1 p.m. high tide. Please mark you calendars. The crane will be arriving at 9:30 and we will start stacking the docks at 10 AM. On Nov. 1 we will have a work party to breakdown the water in the docks and disconnect the electric cables from the stanchions and the SS cabinet on the fixed dock preparing for the following weekend. We will be using the same system as before. Members that are interested please contact me in advance and you will be assigned to a group with a specific task. If you have done this before, you will probably be assigned to the same group. We have six hours with the crane before we start paying overtime so timing and coordination is very important. You must be pre-assigned to a group, so please do not arrive looking to help and put in your hours unless you have been pre-assigned to a group.
