I am hoping to have an update on the upper parking lot situation. We will be meeting in the coming weeks with the town and village. I remain cautiously optimistic that parking on the wall side will become fully available for our use by the start of next season.

We had a recent incident with spilled diesel on the west ramp and into the water. One member and one contractor slipped on the ramp as a result. If you have a spill, please clean it up immediately, and advise the launch staff of the situation to avoid injuries. If this happens again, we may have to ban all fuel cans from the docks for safety reasons.

DOCKS AND FLOATS

As our season winds down, we need to prepare for the removal of our docks. We will have two work parties, the first on 11/1 with a 9 am start to disconnect the water, electrical cables and store them in the docks and disconnect and remove the wi fi. This will be a fairly short work party. The second work party will be on 11/8 with a 10 am start. The crane is confirmed and will be setting up at 9:30 and the first dock will be lifted at 10 am. We have a 1 pm high tide. We expect to be done by 3:30 pm. Lunch will be provided. Please send an email to me at alanwilliamjohnson@gmail. com with the dates you can make. We need a sizable crew to remove the docks in 6 hours and we will be using the same procedures as the spring. If you have already responded there is no need to repeat. All members will be assigned to a crew with specific responsibilities. If you have not responded, please do not arrive expecting work assessment hours. As I am writing this I only have ½ of the number of volunteers to get our docks out on 11/8 within 6 hours. Anything over 6 hours we will be charged a premium overtime rate by the crane company. We have just enough volunteers for the work party on 11/1.

Members are reminded to remove any dock bumpers you have supplied and are not the ones provided by the club. We will be completing the club supplied rub rails as part of our spring projects.

Dinghy Rack

All dinghies, kayaks, SUP and engines must be off the rack unless you have a winter storage contract. Space is limited and overall length is 12'. See Ed Dowd for a contract and the \$150 storage fee is collected through Dockwa. Anything winter stored cannot be past the front edge of the rack. We store the JSP docks VERY close to the rack. Anything left on the racks without a contract will be removed for later disposal.


