

DOCKS & FLOATS

The docks up and running and reservations are going nicely. Reservations and deposits in our Dockwa account are ahead of last year and last year was by far our best ever. We finished installing additional piling hoops and we will be abandoning the old style chain and rollers. The piling hoop will provide an additional lateral resistance to the wind and waves. Ed Nielsen with help from Tony Dutra has completed adding hose bibs to each stanchion and we will be abandoning the hose bibs on the east side of the dock and this will move the water supply pipes inside the docks. The docks have been renumbered with the numbers on the decking where the docks are joined.

The surveys and site plan for the slip expansion has been completed and sent off to the expediter with the notations of the extra piling we will need. The draftsman has made the changes to the site plan. If any member wants to see the site plan please contact me. We will be adding 18 new slips for members for smaller and larger slips and boats.

I have installed new signs on the docks. One is the NYS requirement that all children under 12 must wear a life jacket once they are on our docks and a second sign where the launch docks to keep members off the finger pier until the launch unloads.

We have hired a dock contractor to rework the cleats, hardware and bolts on all the finger piers. We are removing the 3/8" bolts specified because some of them bent last season and they all were loose and replacing them with 1/2" bolts.

Dockwa reservations are going well ahead of last years totals in both advance registrations and money deposited in our bank account and reviews are excellent. We are seeing consistent 5 star reviews on Marina.com.

Memorial Day weekend was a sellout for the mooring field and we had member moorings as a back up. We used member dock space, floating docks and the two 300# moorings. We left no one on the waitlist. Docks did well but did not sell out.

There have projects we would like to complete. Projects include replacing the hand rails on the East dock and installing balusters on the West dock.

We will be making plans to replace the decking on our main dock. Some of our decking is original to 1988 when we started replacing our docks and it is showing its age. Replacing the decking is a time consuming and expensive project and may have to be done over two years and is easiest if done on dry land.

The board is revisiting the rule of no steps on the dock. It is apparent that steps on the 6' wide docks are not a safety issue and the dock rules are being changed. After the dock expansion we will have many wider finger piers. We will be adding 6' and 8' finger piers that will be able to have steps and we will evaluate the safety of steps on the 5' wide finger piers to see if they are safe and present no hazard. We have a one year experiment to see if steps on the 4' wide docks also do not present a hazard.



Described by *WoodenBoat* magazine as "one of the best maintained and sailed classic yachts in the country – if not the world," *Brilliant* is owned by Mystic Seaport Museum, which uses it to run the oldest sail education program in the country.

More than 11,000 teenagers and adults have sailed aboard this schooner over the past 65 years, learning teamwork, leadership, stewardship, and traditional seamanship. Programs range from two to ten days long, during which those onboard fully participate in sailing *Brilliant*, from steering the vessel to raising sails, standing watch to learning navigation.

Designed for extended offshore cruising, *Brilliant* was built in 1932 to unusually high standards of seaworthiness and strength. After serving on antisubmarine patrols during World War II, she joined the Mystic Seaport Museum collection in 1953. Since then, *Brilliant* has sailed across the Atlantic twice, once in 2000 to win a trans-Atlantic race. Her total ocean miles sailed are equivalent to sailing around the world – five times.

2023 PJYC Fishing Tournament

A Tale of Fair to Foul Weather


The 13th Annual PJYC Fishing Tournament was a tale of dichotomous weather and fishing conditions from warm and calm on Friday to windy and cold on Saturday and Sunday. Forty anglers aboard eight vessels contended to land the biggest keeper across four species of fish.

On Friday, Jack Bowman aboard the Fish n' Chips, landed a 2.93 lb. Fluke and a 1.5 lb. Porgy. Both fish took first place in their division. Due to extremely poor conditions on Saturday and Sunday only six more keeper porgies were weighed in with no Stripers or Blue Fish landed that were over the legal-size limit. This year marks the first award for the most Sea Robins caught per capita by each vessel over the course of the entire three-day tournament. Karl Janhsen captaining the vessel Options, took home the Dog Fish Derby mug with an average of 4.2 Sea Robins per angler.

This year the success of this event was the result of the dedicated effort and hard work of Alan and Connie Siris, Patty and Kevin Broderick, Diana Stackow and Alan Rosenblum, Rich Coward, Jean and John Doherty and Ellie Bowman. Thank you also goes out to Alan Johnson and Ed Dowd for their help in coordinating the docking needs during the Tournament.

Description: Beautiful classic Pearson sailboat that has been loved by our family for over 20 years and kept in Port Jefferson Harbor. We purchased the boat in 2001 and in 2012 replaced the original Volvo Penta diesel engine with a Yanmar 3GM 30FC Diesel Engine with a Sail Drive with 2 blade folding prop (probably the only 10M with a sail drive). It is currently in the water in Port Jefferson Harbor.

Structure: Hull and decking is fiberglass reinforced plastic (Decking has nonskid), and bottom is painted with blue anti-fouling paint. In 2020 fiberglass work on keel was completed by Port Jeff Marine (at the Boat Place). Stainless steel bow rail and stern rail, fold down swim ladder, and stainless steel stanchions with double lifelines.

Cockpit: Open cockpit with wheel on pedestal steering, two self-tailing winches, vinyl cockpit cushions.

Interior: Weather boards (recently refinished) for companionway-step down to standing head room interior. Quarter berth and navigation station on port side with lots of storage. Starboard galley with alcohol stove, icebox cooler compartment (that drains into bilge), sink and storage.

Port settee pulls out to full side sleeping berth, and starboard settee pulls out to twin berth (and includes an upper twin berth that can also be used for storage). Forward v-berth cabin. All berths have fabric cushions. Wood flooring has been refinished and there is a pull-down table mounted on the bulkhead.

Forward enclosed head with shower. Replaced head (Raritan) and all hoses in 2014. Two hanging locker closets.

For ventilation, there are two opening deck hatches and two Dorade vents.

Installed new fabricated anodized mast step in 2004.

Sails: Mainsail with full batten and dutchman system (good condition; with Doyle sailcover purchased in 2003). Harken roller furler for jib (#1 Genoa and #2 Genoa). Spinnaker (very little use) and whisker spinnaker pole

Other: Dodger (purchased in 2003) and bimini, both rarely used and in excellent condition.

The hull of Portabote is made with polypropylene - impervious to salt water is incredibly tough. It turns quick and it rows beautifully, with oars that clamp to the oarlocks so you can drop them to cast, that break in the middle for packing, and are foam filled to float. Portabote is comfortable for sitting in, roomy for moving around and steadies enough for stand-up casting. Portabote folds to 4 inches flat. 


