A Miserable and Dangerous Passage

In July, Pesaro spent a few delightful nights at the Rams Head Inn located in Coecles Harbor (pronounced "cockles") on the eastern side of Shelter Island. For those that have not been in a few years, they have all new moorings that can be reserved ahead of time by making a call to "Captain Graeme". Apparently, the RHI dock was chain-sawed apart by the town earlier this year owing to a dispute with the new Rams Head owners who then proceeded to buy the house next door for a few million dollars for its usable dock. Good to be rich! After leaving Shelter Island we had a great sail to Watch Hill, via Gardiners Point into Block Island Sound and then past the southern side of Fishers Island before motoring through Lords Passage against the usual "Sods Law" foul tide.

Watch Hill reminds me of the summer resorts of old with a carousal for the children and one of the best beaches anywhere in the world. A must is taking a short walk to the Watch Hill lighthouse to see the views of the Atlantic Ocean as well as passing the fabulous homes on Lighthouse Road including Holiday House that is owned by Taylor Swift.

After two nights, we decided to head to Essex that is a few miles up the Connecticut River and is another one of our favorite spots. The forecast for the day was overcast with occasional showers with a light north easterly wind. The motor to Stonington Point was pleasant enough and upon entering Fishers Island Sound I hit "goto" for the CT River waypoint on the chart plotter and sat back for an uneventful journey. Of course after 30 minutes the heavens opened and it started to pour with rain that followed us all the way.

Along with rain came close to zero visibility. I knew to head south of Noyes Shoal and then north of Ellis Reef but with the chart plotter zoomed in I happily continued in a straight light oblivious to the next reef until I zoomed out a saw that I was about to hit Ram Reef off Mystic Harbor. A quick 40 degree course change solved the problem but I realized how different it is making a passage along the CT coast without the ability to see what is ahead. I really had to pay attention. But the same thing happened again!

Motoring past the New London entrance markers while watching the Orient Point ferry appear out the gloom, I zoomed out again and saw that I needed to make another 40 degree course correction to go around Bartlett Reef that has nasty rocks to its north as well as only a few feet of water. Once past Bartlett, the next hazard is Hatchet Reef that is close to the CT River entrance but in fact you have to go quite a way out to go around the final marker that is the red buoy close to the Long Island Shoal before heading North West to the CT River entrance.

We made it to Essex and enjoyed a great meal at the Griswold Inn. But the moral of the story is just because you have made the same passage many times, in low visibility it all seems different. Modern navigation technology sometimes leads you into a false sense of security that can go horribly wrong if you don't pay attention and "zoom in" and zoom out" all the time to make sure you see ALL the hazards that are ahead.

Enjoy the rest of your boating season everyone.

DOCKS & FLOATS

We continue to beat last year's reservation revenue on the docks. Over the same time period, through September 15, dock revenue is up 29%. If we continue until the end of the season we should bank about \$46K. In 2017, the year we first tried dockage as an experiment, we banked \$8,300. Moorings are equal to last years YTD totals. The docks are scheduled to be removed November 5 starting at 8 a.m. We will need a bigger turnout than in prior years until we get a handle on moving 38 docks in one day. In prior years we moved 20 docks maximum.

I hope the members are reading the excellent reviews we are getting on Marina.com. The reviews continue to be very favorable.

We are now taking day trip reservations through Dockwa. It has been very successful. Using the 300# moorings and the floating dock as back up has worked great.

I had not planned on another work party but the need one work party to prepare the docks for next spring on October 1 starting at 8 am. We are going to alter the decking to create a continuous utility trough so that the electric cables and water can be easily laid in the trough and not fed through the holes we had previously prepared. I realized too late that the individual hatches and the holes were not the way to go forward. We will still have to prep the docks by disconnecting the wire to be removed from the electrical stanchions. We have hired Lowell Electricians, the contractor that installed the wire, to come in and with his powered equipment, roll the cables onto spools for winter storage and show us how a professional would handle the end of season task. By building the trough we will be able to do this effi-


ciently in house in future years.

Reporting back to the membership, the interest in additional slips was very favorable and we have begun the process. First Ken Babbits is drawing the proposed changes and then we will have the surveying and engineering firm of McLean Associates produce an as built survey and add the proposed docks to the survey. From this we will be able to develop a time line and costs.

NEW CLUB BENEFIT

The PJYC Board of Governors is pleased to announce a change in member benefits starting in 2023.

All Launch, Non-Launch, Emeritus and Honorary members will now be able to use one complimentary space on the club's dinghy rack in the lower parking lot. Small Boat members will continue to receive this benefit.

No registration is required. We just ask that you to place a coastguard "if found" sticker on your vessel for identification purposes. These can be obtained from the dock house.

A second vessel on the storage rack as well as use of our floating storage will continue be charged at the prevailing rate.

As a reminder, all vessels on the storage rack are to be removed prior to the hauling of the docks which in 2022 will take place on November 5th. Any boats remaining after this date will be moved to the end of the storage rack closest to the entrance gates. If not removed after March 31st of the following year, the member will be charged a winter storage fee at the prevailing rate. If the member(s) cannot be identified, the matter will be reported to the Board of Governors for further action.




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


